Kerb these Drivers!

ICOD and the Council have joined forces recently to take up the issue of parking in front of dropped kerbs with the Minister of Transport for Scotland. The matter has also been raised with Anne McGuire the Minister for the Disabled for the UK.

It is hoped that the issue will be resolved by allowing the Roads Authority to create yellow lines across the dropped kerbs at the time they are constructed, therefore inconsiderate drivers continuing to restrict access will be subject to fixed penalties.

A spokesman for ICOD said: "there is no point in trying to improve access in



our area if others don't play their part in keeping access clear. It's sad in a way that it is necessary for enforcement action to have to take place for people to get the message. When requesting someone to remove their car from in front of a dropped kerb recently, the reply was "I don't care", so there really is no other way forward".

Let's hope that the Scottish Executive takes this seriously and helps to improve access for all not just in Inverclyde but throughout Scotland."

sign language courses for the voluntary sector starting in the autumn of this year and places, although limited to a maximum of 15, are FREE courtesy of Inverclyde Alliance.

Enabling Access

ICOD's new companion service for visually impaired people has recently started, we talk to one of its first users

Maggie Sinclair came down from the Island of Barra to study at the Watt College. Maggie is registered blind and found it a little daunting going about the town centre on her own.

Her social worker suggested that she contact ICOD, which was considering starting up a guiding service for the visually impaired. Upon doing so she was immediately involved in setting the guidelines for the scheme and as such became the first user of it.

Maggie said "I always knew what I wanted when I went out to shop but that was not very often and my outings were fairly short but the new service allows time for a coffee and a chat with my guide and shopping has become a much more pleasurable experience".

I now have more self-confidence and all the staff are very friendly and easy going and they make you feel very comfortable. I would recommend it to anyone who is visually impaired and needs to get out and about even just for a walk and a blether".

Isabel Berry who is involved in the scheme paid tribute to Joan Anderson, a social care student, who was on placement from the Watt College and instrumental in getting the scheme off the ground. "Four people have now used the service and all are coming back soon so we must be doing something right!".
